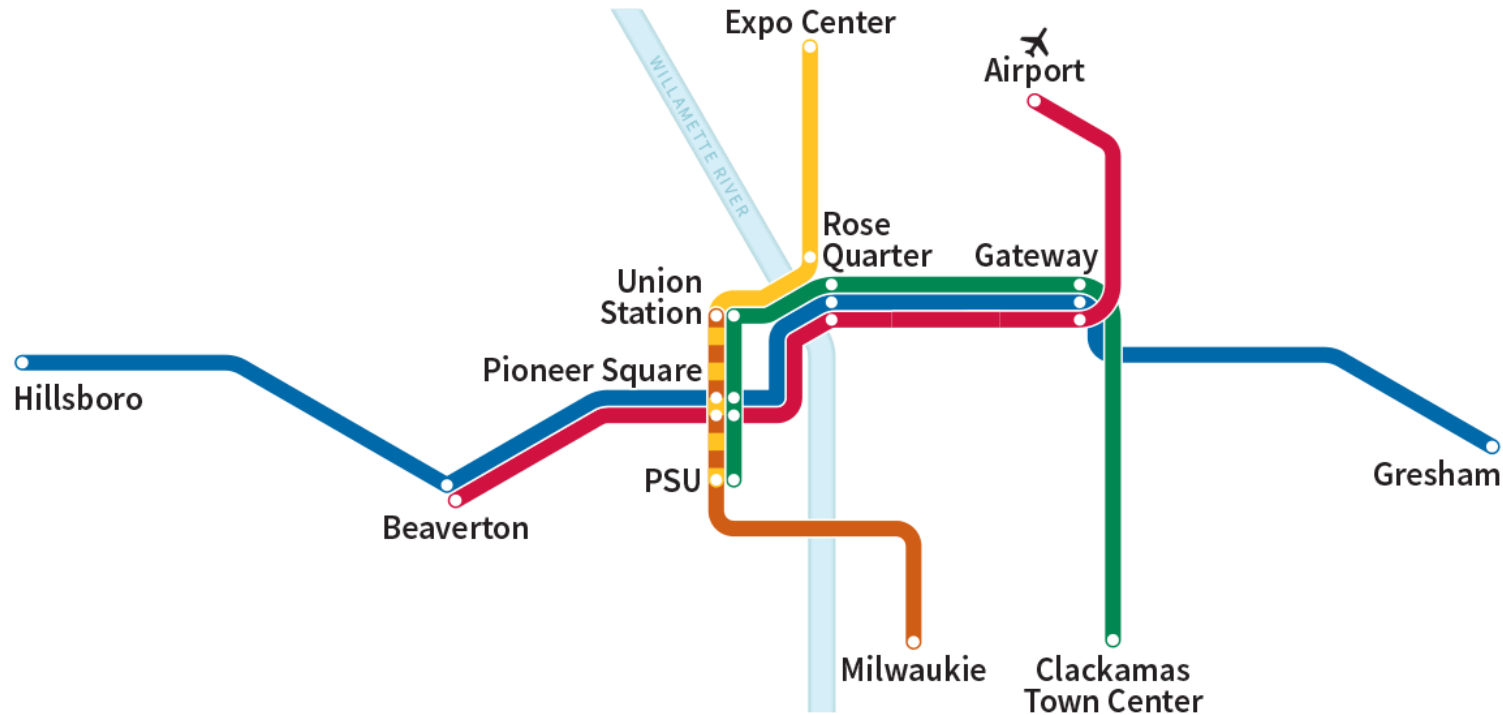
Tuesday, August 3

We hopped on the Red Line, and rode to the Gateway, where we changed to the Green line, and rode to within a block of the hotel, near Portland State University.



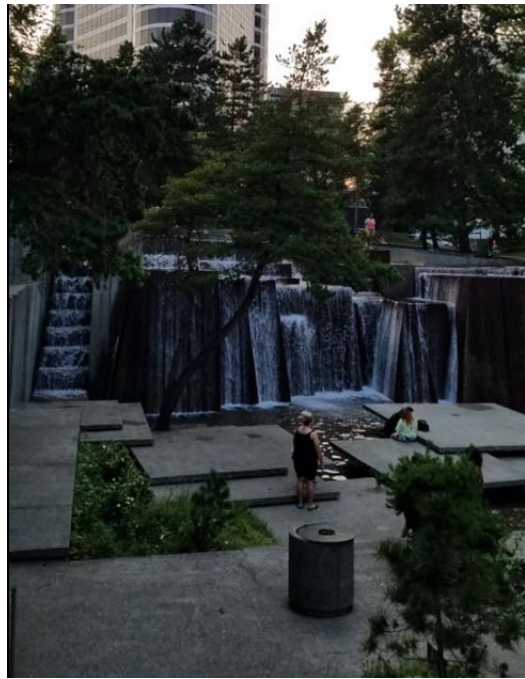
6:12 pm checked into the University Place Hotel and Conference Center

600.010 ORS Limitation on Innkeeper's or Hotelkeeper's liability for valuables. No Innkeeper or Hotelkeeper, whether individual, partnership, or corporation, who constantly has in his inn or hotel a metal safe or suitable vault in good order and fit for the custody of money, bank notes, railroad mileage books or tickets, negotiables or valuable papers and bullion, jewelry, articles of gold and silver manufacture, precious stones and ornaments which are owned, used, held or carried by any guest not as sample merchandise or for sale, and who keeps on the doors of the sleeping rooms used by guests, locks or bolts, and who keeps a copy of ORS 164.125 and 699.010 to 699.060 conspicuously posted in the hotel or inn, as provided in ORS 699.060 is liable for the loss or injury to such property suffered by any guest, unless the guest has offered to deliver the property to the innkeeper or hotelkeeper for custody in such metal safe or vault, and the innkeeper or hotelkeeper has omitted or refused to take it in such safe or vault for custody and to give such guest therefor a receipt, claim check or key to a separate compartment or box in such metal safe or vault.

Complete Liability Statement is Available At Front Desk

IN CASE OF FIRE:

1. Notify the Hotel Operator (dial 0) or pull the nearest fire alarm.
2. Feel the door to see if it's hot before opening it.
3. Do not use the elevator - proceed to the nearest stairway and exit on the ground floor.
4. If unable to exit your room:
A. Close door and seal with wet towels.
B. Stay near the window until help arrives.

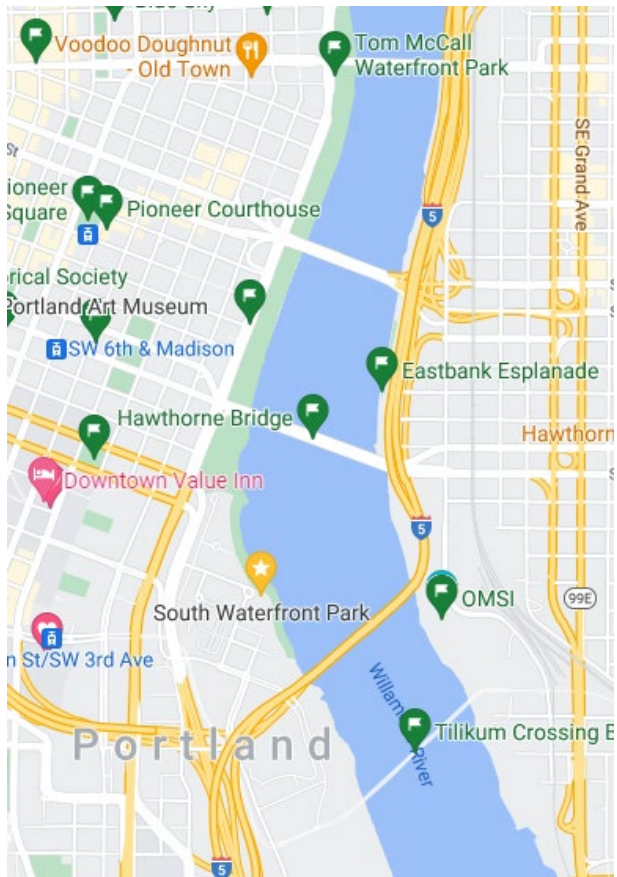




Across the river, is the Museum of Science and Industry, and their submarine.

We turned around and went all the way back to where we started with the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry across the way, and started making our way to the Tilikum Crossing bridge.

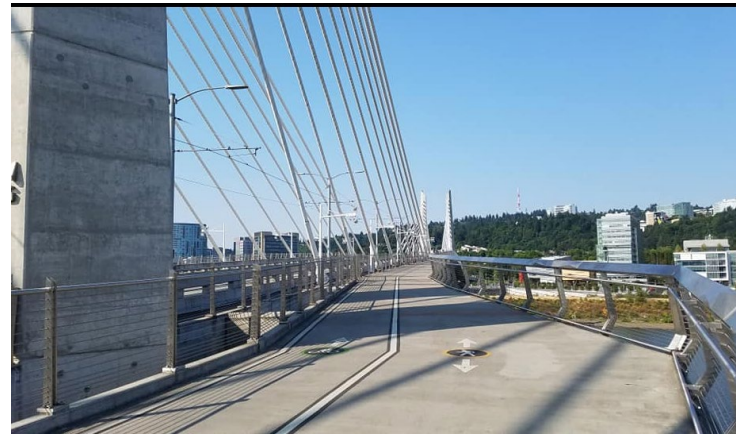

View from the Tilikum Crossing of the Maruam bridge. After a long hike, we got to the other side of the bridge



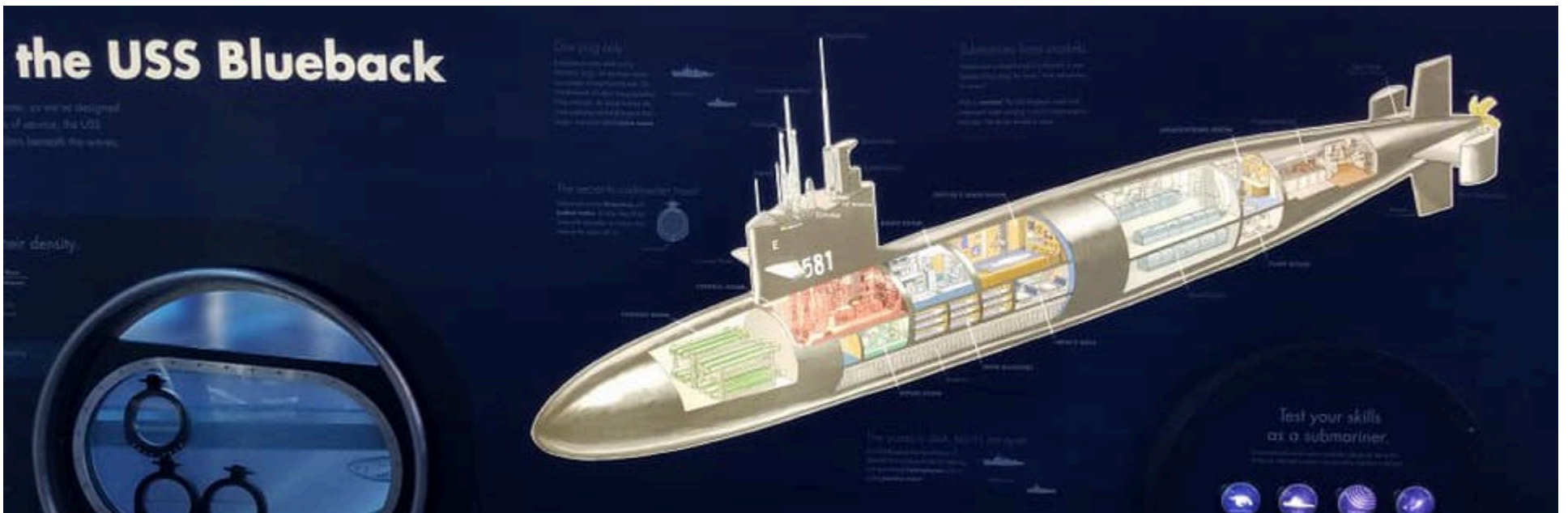
Looking back at the bridge, as we headed to OMSI, the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry.



We were at OMSI primarily to see the Submarine... one of our favorite parts of visiting the Chicago Museum of Science and Industry.



The museum was still closed, so we wandered around for a bit, then headed back at opening time.



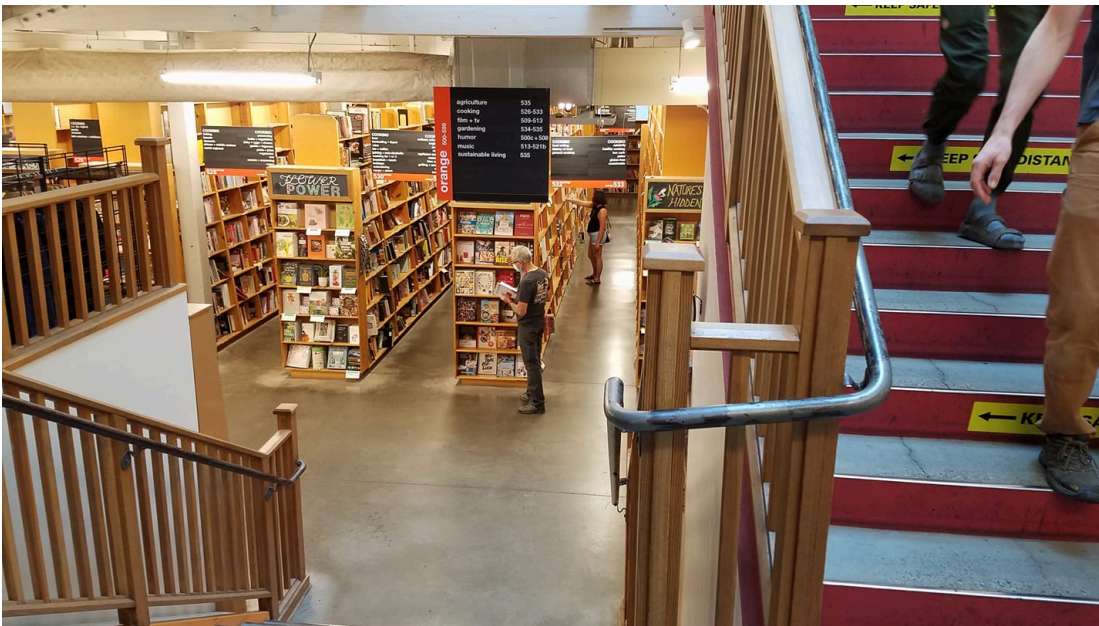


We had a great tour guide on the boat, which is about a city block long, and three stories tall. USS Blueback (SS-581) is a decommissioned Barbel-class submarine formerly in the United States Navy. Blueback was commissioned on 15 October 1959, and was the last non-nuclear submarine to join the United States Navy. The sub was decommissioned on 1 October 1990 and was the last diesel-electric submarine of the United States Navy to leave the fleet, aside from the research sub USS Dolphin. In 1994 OMSI brought the sub to Portland, Oregon, and her propeller was removed and installed outside the museum as a National Submarine Memorial. Blueback appeared in the episode "Samurai" of the 1970s television series Hawaii Five-O and some filming for the Hunt for Red October was done aboard.

We took the streetcar back across the Willamette, grabbed the light rail to the Expo center at the north end of the line, than a Lyft to cross the Columbia river to Vancouver, WA. My brother Marc has a place there and my stepmother just happened be there for a visit, so we had a quick reunion of sorts, for lunch at Wildfin.



After lunch, we reversed our trek, and while riding the streetcar decided to visit Powell's City of Books... covering an entire city block, Powell's City of Books has grown into a Portland landmark and the world's largest new and used bookstore.



After a refresher at the hotel, we walked to Downtown for dinner, and had a great meal at Bangkok Palace.

We started our 32nd anniversary with the standard breakfast at the hotel



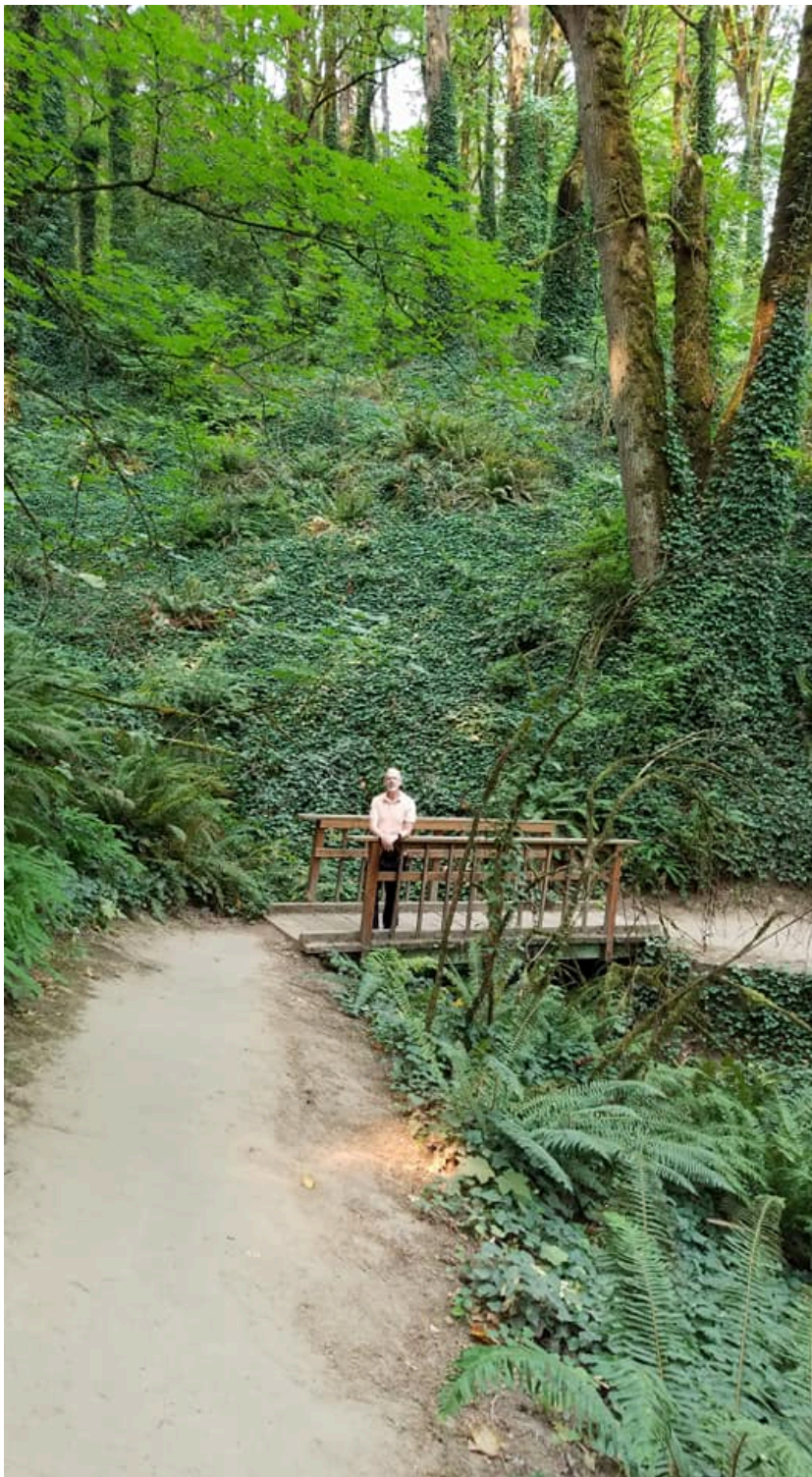
Then we rode the train into a tunnel under Washington Park, rode the elevator to the surface, and hiked to the International Rose Test Garden

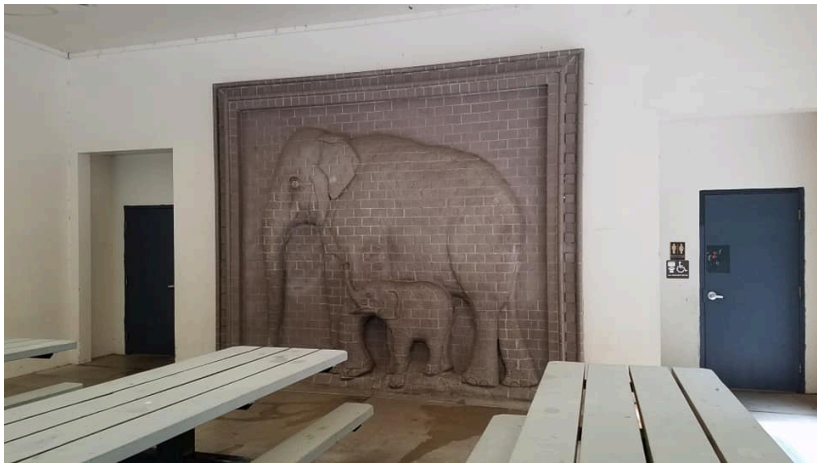




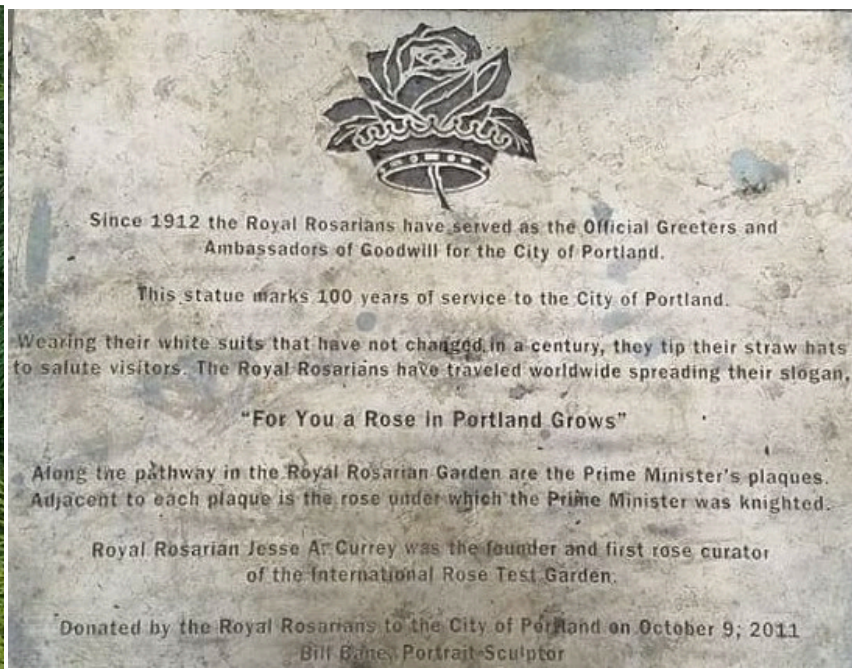
We followed the Maple trail from the Vietnam memorial to the Wildwood trail, then the MAC trail past the old zoo to the Roses

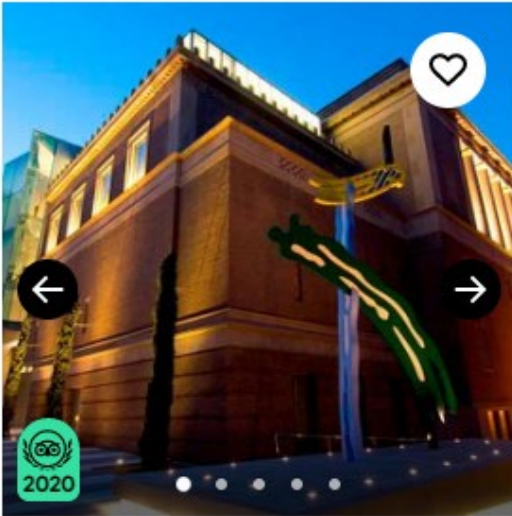
Train to PDX.

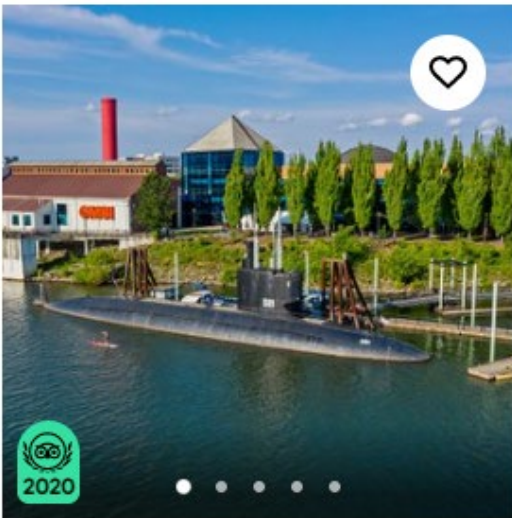

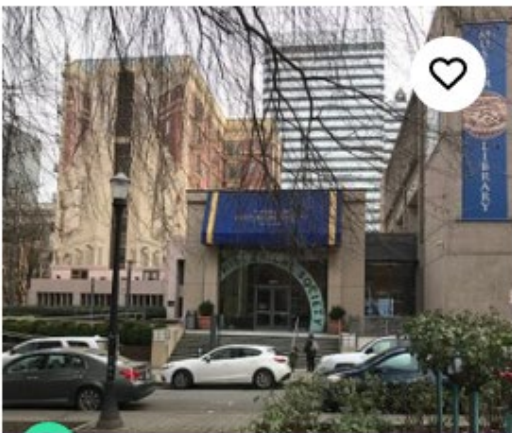
